The bill of fare of the fall months has included plenty of game from our Maine woods. Right now Halsey's deer is providing venison. When the deer was first dressed it was hung from the roof of one of the outdoor stalls so that the lower feet were about two feet from the floor. It was cut in half and some animal came along during the night and carried away a whole quarter. The ground was dry, so it was impossible to see its tracks. Since then various odd bits of meat have been placed in the same place in the hope that the animal would be seen in its prowlings, but each time it gets the meat without being seen. A skunk could not carry away such a large part of a deer. It could be a wildcat, but they are rather rare in this section, and the only other animal large enough in these parts would be a racoon. Halsey is setting a trap and may have some report to make in the next News Letter.

During the latter part of October Dottie and Halsey stowed away provisions for a week and sailed in one of the Cape Cod Nimbles from Portland to Boothbay Harbor and return. Too many interesting things happened on this trip to relate in this letter, but not the least interesting was their assistance in raising a shipwrecked fishing boat near Cape Small where they were camping for the night. They spent one night on Ragged Island, about two miles from the mainland, where Halsey found an Indian arrowhead. It is surprising to learn that the Indians would venture out that far in their small canoes.

Camp is a different place in the fall, and it is unfortunate that more campers can't enjoy the life here during these months.
