RACING SAILBOAT FOR **SEBAGO WOHELO**

The new sailboat for Sebago Wohelo is now almost completed. Captain Rounds has been working on it in the Proctor Academy Boat Shop during the winter, and he expects to be ready for launching by the middle of May. It is an eighteen-foot racing scow which will carry a sail of about two hundred square feet. Boats of this type are considered the fastest type of sailing craft known, and Captain Rounds fully expects it to trim everything on Sebago Lake this coming summer. It will be used by girls who have first proved their ability to handle the Nimblets; as, with its added speed, it is a far trickier boat to handle. It has two centerboards, two rudders, and it is decked over from bow to stern, with no cockpit. It will be sailed by a crew of three or four, but each member will have about twice as much to handle.

FOUR NEW ROWBOATS FOR TIMANOUS

Although Timanous has been wellequipped with boats, there has been a need for small, round-bottom row-boats which could be easily handled by even the smallest boys. Four such boats are now at camp ready to be put in the water as soon as the boys arrive. The boats are eight feet long and will carry three or four small boys, or two grown men. They are equipped to be used with two pairs of oars. All four boats were built in the Boat Shop at Proctor Academy.
