# **LUTHER GULICK CAMPS** FIFTY-SECOND YEAR

The first girl came to Wohelo in 1908 but "Camp Gulick" started many years before. In 1887 Hiiteni and Timanous (Dr. and Mrs. Luther Halsey Gulick) and their two very young children invited a group of friends to join a coöperative Camp Gulick on the shore of the Thames River in the section now known as Gales Ferry. At that time it was an ideal place for a camp and seemed remote from the nearby city of New London. This early Camp Gulick was carried on as a cooperative venture for almost twenty years and during that time many of the features as found in camp today were worked out. In-stead of having just boys and girls, however, different families came and pitched their own tents. One summer ninety-seven people at-tended at one time. One of the features of this early camp was sailing, which was carried on in small flat-bottom rowboats. Although the boats were primitive as compared to those found at camp today, the races were none the less exciting.

"When was camp started?" has been a continual question and a hard one to answer. The formal camp on Sebago Lake was started in 1908, but the real Camp Gulick had its beginning many years before.

# **HURRICANE DID** LITTLE DAMAGE

Many letters have been received asking about the September hurricane. Fortunately, the camps were spared. A great many trees were blown down near the Cape road and in back of the farmhouse, but the loss will not be felt in any way. These trees have been cut, trimmed and sawed into boards and timber and are now ready for any future building programs which may arise.

# SALMON FISHING AT MIGIS LODGE

The ice did not go out of Sebago Lake until the last days of April, which is somewhat later than usual. However, over the weekend of April 30th, Migis Lodge was filled with enthusiastic fishermen. Sebago has always been famous for its land-locked salmon, but as the lake became more and more familiar the salmon became rather scarce. This was apparently due to the fact that the fish were taken each year into the Hatchery and the eggs were hatched and distributed throughout the other lakes in Maine. During the past few years, however, Sebago Lake has had a fair return from the Hatchery and the number of fish has increased proportionately. Now fishermen are frequently catching four- and fivepound salmon and Sebago Lake has once more the right to be called a Paradise for the fishing enthusiast.
