A skunk could not carry away such a large part of a deer. It could be a wildcat, but they are rather rare in this section, and the only other animal large enough in these parts would be a racoon. Halsey is setting a trap and may have some report to make in the next News Letter.

During the latter part of October Dottie and Halsey stowed away provisions for a week and sailed in one of the Cape Cod Nimblets from Portland to Boothbay Harbor and return. Too many interesting things happened on this trip to relate in this letter, but not the least interesting was their assistance in raising a shipwrecked fishing boat near Cape Small where they were camping for the night.
