GIFTS FOR WOHELO AND TIMANOUS GRANDCHILDREN

The camp has just ordered a large number of hand-made Mexican chairs, which will be sent to the first children of all former campers. They are to be made by a Mexican who lives on the border of Texas. The chairs are of natural wood with rush-bottom seats, identical to the ones that were used at Tiny Wohelo last summer, only a size smaller, with a Wohelo Bird or a Timanous Triangle stencilled on the back. As the gentleman who makes them graphically describes them, they are "baby chairs four years old eight inches high on the front by nine inches on the seat and by fourteen inches high on the back, shipped by freight."

Katherine and Charlotte Gulick have used them all winter and report them comfortable and exceedingly sturdy, fortunately.

Many Wohelo and Timanous children have outgrown these chairs. Halsey, for instance, had to pass his on to Charlotte, who, not being a first GREAT-grandchild, wasn't entitled to one. However, no matter what size you are, you may want one anyway, either for your dolls or for your children.

The chairs will be ready about the first of July and will be shipped from camp. We advise your mother (or you, if you're big enough) to write in early, since the sixteen births we announce in this issue are making our order look pretty insufficient and if you're not speedy you may have to wait for the second shipment and find that in the meantime you've outgrown the chair.

As for you campers whose first babies are twins—we mention no names—well, you're just lucky!
