FRANCES GULICK DIES SUDDENLY IN NEW YORK

Frances Jewett Gulick died on Tuesday, November 24th, in the Memorial Hospital in New York City.

"Franta" was known to all of the old campers and their parents as well. She was born in Springfield, Massachusetts, on April 6, 1891. During her life she was in camp every summer from its beginning in 1907 until the World War, and after the war until she took over Migis Lodge in 1923. She directed Little Wohelo when it was in its infancy, and had charge of the camp farm for one year. Franta was active in the early days of the Camp Fire Girls and conducted the first training school for Camp Fire Guardians. She did social service work for a number of years in New York City and for one year in the mining camps of Alaska. During the World War she was Overseas for two years, attached principally to the First Division. Over there she ran a Canteen during the day and delivered newspapers to the first-line trenches at night. She was cited several times for bravery. One of her citations read: "Miss Frances Gulick, attached to the First United States Engineers, has displayed the finest qualities of energy, courage, and devotion in the discharge of her duties throughout the war, notably during the aerial bombardment at Bernaise, May 30, 1918, where, in spite of many casualties in the town, she remained at her post. Miss Gulick, with total disregard for her own personal safety, continued to operate her Canteen, although the town was being shelled, and the Canteen, itself. was struck.

In 1923, feeling that the benefits of camp life should not be limited to children under eighteen, Franta took over the National Camps and Hotel, in South Casco, remodelled it, renamed it "Migis Lodge" and opened it to the parents and friends of camp children

Her funeral was held at the home of her sister, Louise Gulick Robinson, 370 Bedford Road, Pleasantville, N. Y., at eleven-thirty, on the morning of Thursday, November 26, 1936.

Frances Gulick will be missed by all the campers who were at camp from 1907 through 1936, as well as by the numerous parents who, first stopping at "Migis" when they had children at camp, have continued to come back every summer.

PRESIDENT NEW ENGLAND ASS'N CAMP DIRECTORS

Starting with this fall Halsey is serving his third winter as President of the New England Association of Camp Directors. There is a revival of interest in the Association at the present time due to the gift from Walter Chrysler of one hundred thousand dollars, which will be used for research work in the camping field.

Besides being President of the New England group, Halsey is also on the National Executive Committee and a member of the Committee for the National Convention to be held in Detroit this winter.

NEW UNITS AT SEBAGO WOHELO

Since the inauguration of the new Unit plan there has been a slight tendency to neglect some of the real camping activities. For those who really want to camp and lead the rugged existence in primitive style, the camp is offering a unit which will devote most of its time to outdoor cooking, trips, fishing, making of primitive shelters, riflery, and the other activities which have to do with real camping. The Unit is to be led by Mr. and Mrs. A. Barr Sniveley, Jr., who have had years of camping experience. They will go on all trips away from camp and plan the home program for their Unit. Mr. Sniveley will be known as "Whoops," a name familiar to all Princetonians as he was elected Captain of the 1923 championship football team.

Another new group is the Tutoring Unit. For years the camps have turned girls away because they needed to make up lost work during the summer. It was felt that girls (Continued on page 3, col. 2)
