FALL MONTHS AT CAMP

We are apt to think of camp as closing when the girls go home in August and remaining inactive until the next summer. As a matter of fact a great deal goes on during the other months in preparation for the eight weeks in July and August.

There has been more activity this fall

than usual and when camp opens next sum-mer there will be a number of conspicuous changes. In the first place, Barracks has been permanently removed and a new cabin has

been built near the Bent Nail.

The swimming dock has been entirely rebuilt and the canoe-house has been moved away from the Lewa cabins and now runs parallel to the shore under the high Haeramai Rock.

All the cabins have been carefully checked and new posts and railings have been added where needed. Wokonahet, the Infirmary, and the Guest House have all been re-roofed. The Garage has a new runway and there is

a new porch on both the lower and upper levels of the new Weaving House.

At Little Wohelo a new Canoe House is under construction and many minor repairs have been made to put the cabins in excellent condition. Some of the low places on the Playground are being filled in, so that water will not collect in them during wet days.

NEW BOATS FOR LITTLE WOHELO

A new and complete boat-building shop has been installed at Proctor Academy and the instructor of this work is Mr. Walter Rounds of South Casco. During the free periods he is building a fleet of small row-boats for Little Wohelo. These small boats are eight feet long and thirty-six inches wide and are on much the same lines as yacht

It is very difficult to find adequate small boats which can be handled by younger children with the same degree of ease and efficiency as larger people handle the ordinary sized boats. The new eleven- and thirteenfoot canoes were a great boon to Little Wood help last summer and as a result the cide helo last summer and as a result the girls showed far more interest in paddling and attained far more skill. The new small rowboats will help to bring the water equipment

still closer to the needs of young children.

Halsey has become so interested in this work that he has been using much of his free time in building a boat himself. If it is used at camp next summer, it should be given a special name and made the Flagship of the Fleet.
