Ben Baker has the position of regular night nurse at the Deerfield Academy Infirmary.


Bob Bensen played on the Deerfield Varsity soccer team this fall. Previously he had always played in the halfback line, but this season he was at the inside right position.

CAMP FAMILIES

Answering a challenge of Lucy Barnard Briggs' we delved into the figures of the families who had sent the most campers to camp over the longest period of years, and discovered a lot of interesting things.

For the greatest number of campers over a period of years (counting brothers, sisters, and cousins) the Binghams, of West Newton, Mass., win. One or more members of their immediate family, Tattie, Betty, Eleanor and Mary, were in camp from 1921 through 1932. Their cousin, Eunice Jameson, came in 1927 and stayed through 1929. Now they have three cousins in camp, Katharine, Lyman and Morton Hull, of Chicago, the children of Dolly Walker Hull, who was at camp in 1917. Since Dolly hadn't married a Bingham relative in 1917, we refuse to count her in the total, and only credit them with eight.
